EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 Sections 32-36

Section 32 - Kinds of premises in respect of which off-licences may be issued:

- 1. An off-licence may be issued only:
 - (a) to the holder of an on-licence issued for a hotel or tavern, for the premises (or part of the premises) for which the on-licence is held: or
 - (b) for retail premises where (in the opinion of the licensing authority or licensing committee concerned) at least 85% of the annual sales revenue is expected to be earned from the sale of alcohol for consumption somewhere else; or
 - (c) if:
 - i) the premises for which it is to be issued are not retail premises; and
 - at least 85% of the annual income of the person to whom it is to be issued is (in the opinion of the licensing authority or licensing committee concerned) expected to be earned from the remote sale of alcohol; or
 - (d) for premises where (in the opinion of the licensing authority or licensing committee concerned) the principal business carried on is the manufacture of alcohol; or
 - (d) for premises that (in the opinion of the licensing authority or licensing committee concerned) are a supermarket with a floor area of at least 1,000 m² (including any separate departments set aside for such foodstuffs as fresh meat, fresh fruit and vegetables, and delicatessen items); or
 - (f) for premises that (in the opinion of the licensing authority or licensing committee concerned) are a grocery store.
- 2. Premises for which (by virtue of <u>Section 350(b)(i)</u>) an off-licence must not be issued except to a licensing trust can still be premises for which (by virtue of subsection(1)) an off-licence may be issued.
- 3. Section 36 overrides subsection(1).

Section 33 - Determining whether premises are a grocery store

1. In this section:

Food product

- (a) does not include
 - i) alcohol, confectionery, ready-to-eat prepared food, or snack food; or
 - ii) a drink (other than milk) sold in a container with a capacity of 1 litre or less; but
- (b) includes delicatessen items that are not read-to-eat prepared food or snack food.

Grocery store means a shop that

- (a) has the characteristics normally associated with shops of the kind commonly thought of as grocery shops; and
- (b) comprises premises where
 - i) a range of food products and other household items is sold; but
 - ii) the principal business carried on is or will be the sale of food products.

Ready-to-eat prepared food

- (a) includes food for the time being declared by regulations under this Act to be ready-to-eat prepared food; and
- (b) does not include food for the time being declared by regulations under this Act not to be ready-to-eat prepared food

Snack food

- (a) includes food for the time being declared by regulations under this Act to be snack food; and
- (b) does not include food for the time being declared by regulations under this Act not to be snack food.

Enclosed please find an application for the grant of a new off-licence in the name of Angelin Enterprises Limited. The premises to which this application relates is located at 15C Minden Road, Te Puna, and is to be known as Te Puna Liquor.

The premises are currently unlicensed, and I seek urgency with the processing of this application.

Term of licence Sought

I seek the issues of a licence in terms of section 17 of the Act, authorising the sale and delivery of liquor from the premises. I qualify to hold such a licence pursuant to section 32(1)(b) of the Act.

Request for Urgency

The application is for a new liquor store. There is no existing licence in force and thus I am unable to trade on a temporary authority.

Once the licence is granted, the premises will undergo fit out. Proposed opening date is anticipated for the mid of January 2021.

Any assistance the Committee, Licensing Inspector, Police and Public Health can offer in the speedy processing of this application would be enormously appreciated.

I, the Director has no criminal convictions.

I have been working in Liquor industry since January 2014. Initially started as a Team Member and completed LCQ course and gained a Managers Certificate in July 2014. From 2015 to 2019, I have managed many liquor retail stores in Tauranga, Te Puke, Katikati under the employer Jaspal Singh, contact number 02102344984.

There is no reason to believe that the applicant is not a suitable entity to hold a liquor licence.

Planning / Building Matters

The applicant has been issued with a Compliance Certificate for the activity.

Environment

As the business is that of a retail store, it is deemed to be "low risk" in terms of noise, however vandalism and nuisance levels resulting from the issue of this licence has the potential to be an increased risk. The following is offered for completeness:

Neighboring land use:

The premises are located in the middle of a commercial area of Te Puna shopping complex. In the same building is a Sports bar and Backpackers. Neighboring businesses are Naked Meat butchery, Te Puna Deli, Te Puna Takeaways, White House café, Share The Point Digital training, Te Puna Kindergartens.

There are two other alcohol outlets in the locality, one is 'Liquor Centre Te Puna' within 50m and other is 'Four Square Te Puna' within 100m.

Te Puna Population

Attached is an Official information requested from Western Bay of Plenty Council, showing the current population of Te Puna to be 2712 (taken in 2018).

In year 2028 - 2960

Locality in relation to perceived sensitive premises

Within a 500m radius of the subject site, the following premises have been identified:

The issue of a licence for the proposed premises will have little or no impact on the above listed premises. There are no schools in the immediate surrounding environment. Te Puna school is 2.3km walk from the proposed store.

Current and potential noise levels

The nature of the business means that the potential noise effects are minimal.

Security Plan

It is anticipated that there will be no need to have dedicated security on a day to day basis but security staff will be engaged for busy Christmas and New Year periods. Security staff will have the required qualifications and will be crowd controllers. There will be sufficient lighting at the front of the store, and adequate visibility into the store.

Should any incident occur that is beyond the control of the manager, the Police will be called.

Closed Circuit (CC) Cameras will be installed to assist staff and Police in regard to any investigation. Footage will be freely available to Police, should any request be made. We also intend to make sure there are no blind spots, so that all areas of the store are viewable, either by line-of-sight or by Camera viewing screen, from the point of the cashier's counter.

If indoor/outdoor insufficient lighting exists when we outfit the store, we intend to rectify this problem for security reasons. Good lighting also helps staff to properly check identifications when necessary.

Current and Potential levels of nuisance and Vandalism

Any person creating nuisance or vandalism in or around the premises, will be trespassed. The incident will be recorded in the incident register and will be reported to the Police.

There is no reason to believe that the issue of this licence will negatively impact on the neighboring environment amenity and good order.

If there are any issues presented by the public to the store, we intend to provide our contact details to assist in a solution being found.

Visual Amenity

The store exterior walls will contain no pictorial promotional signage. Photos are not available at this stage, as fit out will not commence until there is certainty that the licence will issue.

Premises

Neighbour within the Same Building

The store that is situated in the same building premises as the proposed store is a Sports Bar and a TAB and also a Backbackers. The owner has provided me with a letter of no objection to open "a wholesale liquor outlet only". This letter is attached.

Landlord consent

We will hold a lease for the premises that has a final expiry date of 1st November 2038, if all rights of renewal are exercised. The owner of the building, Commons Holding Limited, has no objection to a licence being held on the premises. A letter to that effect is attached with this application, from the owner and copy of schedule one from the lease is attached to this application. This clearly show the permitted use being that of a liquor store.

Principal Entrance

The principal entrance of the premises precisely shown on the attached photographs.

Conduct of Licence

Management of the proposal

I, Barinderpal Singh, am responsible for the overall management of the business. I hold a current Managers Certificate numbered 21/CERT/22901/2018.

Best practice will be for four certificated duty managers to be employed at the premises. This will ensure that at all times the premises are open for the sale and supply of liquor; the requirements of the Act are adhered to. The duty manager will take control of any situation that may lead to a breech in the provisions of the Act.

Evidence of age documents will be requested when deemed necessary. All appropriate signage will be displayed.

The front window will contain no promotional signage. This will ensure that the duty manager has sufficient visibility into the street and surrounding properties.

Staff Training

The Director will also ensure that all staff will be fully trained in their requirements and responsibilities under the Act. Particular attention will be paid to the identification of minors and signs of intoxication. Staff training plan is attached.

Conclusion

This is an application for a new Off-Licence for premises that have not previously held a licence. Urgency is sought with the processing of this application.

This is a private company with One director and one shareholder. There is no reason to believe that this entity is no longer suitable entity to hold a liquor licence.

 - Purpose of Act- The purpose of the Act is to put in a place a system of control over the sale and supply of alcohol that it is reasonable and helps to achieve the Object of this Act, for the benefit of the community as a whole.
 - Object of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act- what act is designed to achieve
 - a) The sale, supply, and consumption of alcohol should be undertaken safely and responsibly;

- 4. Management of Licensed Premises
 - Manager must be on duty at all times when alcohol is available to be sold or supplied to the public
 - Manager is responsible for:
 - The compliance with and enforcement of the provisions of the Act
 - The compliance with and enforcement of the conditions of the licence
 Conducting the premises with the aim of minimising alcohol related
 - harm
 - Manager must hold a current managers certificate.
 - Temporary and Acting Manager
 - In the event of a genuine emergency, these are two helpful provisions build in the Act.
 - Notice of Management change- whenever there is a change in Manager (i.e. a new Manager starting or an existing Manager leaving), or the appointment of a Temporary manager or Acting manager, the Licensee must notify both the DLC and local Police, within 2 working days of the appointment or change taking place.
 - Manager Register: must be maintained with full legal name, date of birth, gender, managers' certificate number and expiry, date of appointment as a Manager for the premises, date that employment as a Manager was terminated, for each period that someone serves as an acting Manager, the date of appointment and the date that the appointment ceased, the reason for the appointment as Acting or Temporary Manager including the name of the Manager whose absence the appointment was intended to cover, the date that the Licensee notified the relevant DLC and the Police of the appointment, cancellation or termination of the Manager, Acting or Temporary Manager, the date that application for a manager's certificate was made for a Temporary Manager
 - This register must be kept for atleast 2years, after it is recorded, even if the premises ceases trading during that time.
 - 5. Offences and Penalties
 - All alcohol sales must be done by the Duty Manager, it is an offence otherwise.
 - Duty Manager make sure store is not doing any irresponsible promotion of alcohol, such as selling alcohol at 25% or more below the ordinary price,

promoting alcohol free of charge, except for complimentary tasting or promotions that are held within the licensed premises that cannot be seen or heard from outside the premises.

- Duty Manager must make sure to ask for a valid acceptable ID from any person looking 25years old or under. Acceptable IDs are a current NZ driver's licence, a current passport, HNZ 18+ ID card, Kiwi Access card.
- Duty Manager must make sure he is not selling alcohol to any intoxicated person, he should follow applicable steps to identify intoxication such as SCAB (speech, coordination, appearance, behaviour.
- People who are suspected of buying alcohol for homeless or any person under the age of 18years, must be trespassed and reported in the incident book and to the Police.
- The Manager must not allow a minor to enter or remain unaccompanied in a supervised area
- Manager or an employee must not be intoxicated while on duty
- Manager must not allow intoxicated person to remain on the premises
- Manager must not allow any violent, quarrelsome, insulting or disorderly conduct to take place on the premises
- The manager must take all reasonably practicable steps to ensure that the Licensee does not sell or supply alcohol on or from the premises contrary to the requirements of the Act or the licence conditions
- 6. Suspension or Cancellation of License or Manager's Certificate
 - A constable or an inspector may at any reasonable time enter and inspect the premises, to ascertain whether the Licensee is complying with the provisions of the Act and the conditions of the licence.
 - They can require the production of any licence or any book, notice, list or other document that is required by the Act to be kept.
 - Failure to comply with their requests in a timely manner is an offence.

The management and staff of Te Puna Liquor have a responsibility to provide an environment where alcohol is sold responsibly. Because of this, we have implemented the following Social Host Responsibility policy.

- We are committed to encouraging the responsible sale and supply of alcohol.
- · It is against the law to serve anyone who is intoxicated. Intoxicated persons will be asked to leave the premises.
- It is against the law to serve alcohol to minors. If we are in doubt about your age, we will ask for identification.
- · We operate an ID25 programme. If you look 25 years of age or under, you will be asked to produce one of the following:
 - O A current New Zealand or overseas passport

Social Host Responsibility Implementation Plan

A socially responsible host:

- 1. is well trained and fully understands their legal and social obligations
- 2. does not serve alcohol to minors and does not sell alcohol to an adult who intends to on-supply to a minor

- 4. serves alcohol responsibly or not at all
- 5. promotes and encourages responsible drinking practices
- 6. does not allow violent, insulting, disorderly or quarrelsome behaviour on the premises
- <u>A socially responsible host is well trained</u>- A socially responsible host is well trained and fully understands both their legal obligations and their role in reducing alcoholrelated harm. Training helps provide staff with clear roles and responsibilities, and models service and interventions that ensure premises meet their legal obligations. <u>Staff Training Manual</u>- Attached.
- 2. A socially responsible host does not serve alcohol to minors-
 - Guide to checking ID
 - Ask to see the customer's ID if they look 25 or under.
 - o The customer must remove the ID from their wallet.
 - Check the date of birth (know the cut-off birth date at which you must deny customers access to your premises).
 - DO NOT look at the picture first; look at the picture last.
 - Feel the surface and edges of the card with your thumb, checking for blemishes or tampering.
 - FIRST, while talking to the customer, look for distinguishing features on their face, nose, chin and jaw.
 - SECOND, look at the picture on the card ensure this has the same features as the face.
 - o Shine a torch from behind the photo and the date of birth.
 - If further validation is required, check their signature against the card (get them to sign).
 - Can you PROVE to Police you have ID-ed them? (Cameras/Notebook/Stamp)
 - Fake and fraudulent ID Every effort must be made to prevent the use of fake or fraudulently presented ID to purchase alcohol. Note any incidents of suspected presentation of fraudulent ID in the INCIDENT LOG.
 If you are suspicious that ID has been tampered with or is fraudulently presented, follow the steps outlined below:
 - Ask the person if they have another form of identification (in many instances a person will only have one form of fake ID and if they produce another form of ID it may help to verify their identity).

- If the presented ID has a signature, invite the person who has presented the ID to sign a blank piece of paper and compare the signature to the one on the ID.
- Record the details of the suspected fake ID and any other ID that may be produced in the INCIDENT LOG. Record the particulars of the person presenting the ID and their next-of-kin (home address and phone number(s)).
- Tell the person who has presented the ID that it appears to be fraudulently presented and: – note their explanation – ask them if they are willing to wait until the Police arrive to inspect the ID – deny service.
- Wait with the person until Police arrive. If the person will not wait for Police but agrees to
- abandon the ID, follow the steps below: Record the details of the ID in the INCIDENT LOG. - Arrange to drop the ID to the Police Station or Alcohol Harm Reduction Officer. - Insist the person obtains an authentic ID before any future entry into the venue and service will be considered.
- If the person demands the return of the ID: you should return the ID to the person, as you have no statutory power to seize the ID – make contact with other licensed premises in your area and alert them to the suspected fake or fraudulently presented ID and give them a description of the person – record the circumstances and person's description and forward these to the Police (Alcohol Harm Reduction Officer).
- Note: Do not use force to retain the ID.
- If the person presenting the ID leaves the licensed premises, leaving the document with you or one of your staff members, you must:
 - secure the ID (for handover to the Police)
 - record the time, date and circumstances surrounding the abandonment of the ID
- <u>On-supply to minors-</u> A socially responsible host does not serve alcohol to adults who intend supplying this alcohol to minors. This is called social supply and most minors obtain their alcohol this way. Suspected person should be refused and trespassed.
- <u>A socially responsible host does not sell alcohol to intoxicated customers</u> The Act prohibits any licensee or manager from:
 - o allowing an intoxicated person to enter the premises
 - selling or supplying alcohol to an intoxicated person
 - o allowing an intoxicated person to be or remain on licensed premises
 - allowing disorderly conduct on premises.

If an intoxicated person enters the premises, they must be removed immediately.

The Act states that a person is intoxicated when he or she is observably affected by alcohol, other drugs, or other substances (or a combination of two or all of those things) to such a degree that two or more of the following are evident:

- Speech is impaired.
- Coordination is impaired.
- Appearance is affected.
- o Behaviour is impaired.

4. A socially responsible host sells alcohol responsibly or not at all

Off-licensed premises are under no compulsion to sell alcohol to a potential customer who enters the store. Sellers must be able to satisfy themselves that by serving alcohol they will not further contribute to the levels of alcohol-related harm in the community. Refusal of service should be viewed as an indication you are concerned your customers' welfare. Staff must comply with their legal obligations under the Act.

If a customer is visiting a bottle store more than once a day, best practice premises will take extra care to determine whether the customer is intoxicated or requires support of any kind.

2 Drinks per day policy- should be applied at all times, should not be served 3rd time in a day.

- 5. <u>A socially responsible host promotes responsible drinking practices</u> Alcohol promotions
 - The Act creates offences and penalties for certain irresponsible alcohol promotions or activities. These can result in fines and licence suspensions, could have a negative impact on the licence or Manager's Certificate (e.g. at renewal), and can also damage the reputation and prospects of a business. It is an offence to:
 - encourage excessive consumption of alcohol
 - promote or advertise discounts on alcohol of 25% or more, anywhere that can be seen or heard from outside the licensed premises
 - promote or advertise free alcohol (unless the promotion/advertisement cannot be seen or heard from outside the premises)
 - offer goods, services or prizes on the condition that alcohol is bought (unless the offer is made on the premises about buying alcohol on the premises)
 - promote alcohol in a way that has special appeal to minors.
- 6. A socially responsible host does not allow disorderly conduct

Any customer displaying disorderly behaviour, such as arguments, fighting, damage or theft, should be removed from the premises. Any incident that happens on your premises, whether significant or not, should be recorded in an INCIDENT LOG.

1. APPLICATION DESCRIPTION

1.1 Application and Property Details

2. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 1. This is a report on an application for an off-licence in the Te Puna commercial area. The criteria found at section 105 of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 (the Act) applies to this application.
- 2. The applicant is seeking an off-licence for a bottle store.
- 3. Based on the information provided in the application and a meeting with the applicant, I consider the applicants proposal for the sale and supply of alcohol is not consistent with the purpose of the Act and I have concerns that the proposal does not meet the criteria under section 105 of the Act.
- 4. Four public objections have been submitted. New Zealand Police and I have opposed this application. The Medical Officer of Health has not opposed this application.

3. APPLICANT

3.1 Background and Suitability

- 5. The applicant is a private limited company, incorporated on 28 July 2020.
- 6. The Director, Barinderpal Singh, of Angelin Enterprises Limited was invited into the Council offices on 10 November 2020 to discuss and elaborate further on the application. The premises situated at 15C Minden Road, Te Puna is an empty store, and the Director has stated he will not progress the store fit-out until such time he is granted a licence.
- 7. This is the first solo venture for the applicant and the Director has obtained his experience in the liquor industry from working under the wing of the companies operated by Jaspal Singh, such as the Bottle-O Te Puke and Merivale Liquor Centre, Merivale. The applicant also informed me he was responsible for turning around the Orchard Thieves Pizza business next door to the Bottle-O Te Puke, so it was making a profit.
- 8. Barinderpal Singh and his wife will be the directors of the business. Both directors have General Manager's Certificates.

3.2 Eligibility

9. The premises is currently un-licensed and has been loaned out by the landlord to house a Charity Shop to raise funds through the COVID-19 pandemic. This application is for an off-licence under section 32(1)b, a retail premises where at least 85% of the sales revenue is generated through the sale of alcoholic beverages to be consumed off site. The application also states that the premises would sell tobacco products such as cigarettes.

3.3 Comments

 No information has come to light to question the applicant's suitability. There are no concerns with the goods and/or services the applicant intends to provide at this point.

4. OBJECTIONS AND EXTERNAL REPORTS

4.1 Public Notice

11. The application was publicly notified in the following paper:

Bay of Plenty Times

- First Notice: 31 October 2020
- Second Notice: 7 November 2020
- Objection period expiry: 20 November 2020

4.2 Objections

12. There have been four public objections to the application:

1. Kent and Birgitte Clark – received 15 November 2020.

Local residents who do not see how another bottle store will benefit the local area and that by increasing the availability of alcohol in the local area will only lead to excessive consumption. They also have concerns with the potential risks of increasing the alcohol supply so close to State Highway 2, where there are already too many accidents.

2. Robyn Mitchell – received 16 November 2020.

States there is no justification for another bottle store in the local area. Robyn owns and operates a sandwich business next door to the current liquor store (Te Puna Liquor Centre). Although I cannot confirm at this point, I suspect Robyn leases her premises from a company linked to the Te Puna Liquor Centre.

3. Joanne O'Keeffe – received 16 November 2020.

Joanne states that it is 'absolutely ridiculous' to have another liquor outlet. Joanne and her partner own and operate the White House restaurant in Te Puna.

4. Scott Crook – received 19 November 2020.

Scott states that there is no need for another off-licence in the little village of Te Puna as there are enough already.

- 13. All four objectors were contacted via email with reference to Section 102 (objections to applications) and the criteria under Section 105, and asked to respond by the end of business, Friday, 20 November 2020. No objectors responded.
- 14. The objections were forwarded onto the applicant.

4.3 Police Report

 New Zealand Police provided a report on the application on 19 January 2021. Their report opposes the application.

4.4 Medical Officer of Health Report

16. The Medical Officer of Health provided a report on the application on 28 June 2021. Their report does not oppose the application.

5. **PREMISES**

5.1 Principal Entrance

17. The principal entrance would be accessed from allocated car parking outside the front of 15C Minden Road, Te Puna.

5.2 Kind of Premises

Main Premises

- 18. The plan of the premises primarily consists of a large room with a serving counter on the left-hand side. On the right-hand side of the room is access to a chiller room. The room will contain wall shelving to house wine, spirits, and craft beer. The main floor area will be reserved for floor displays.
- 19. The entire premises has been planned to be designated as a supervised area.

Licensed area

- 20. The licensed area will be the entire premises.
- 21. The licensed area is more precisely defined on the plan included with the application as received by Western Bay of Plenty District Council on 27 October 2020.

Designated area

22. The entire premises is planned to be designated as supervised as the planned principal business is to be the sale of alcoholic beverages.

Identified risks

- 23. Without actually seeing the premises set up as a bottle store it is rather difficult to envisage what issues the design and layout may have.
- 24. Looking at the plans, the design is essentially open plan. Therefore, the duty manager working behind the counter should be able to oversee the entire floor.
- 25. Not serving or allowing intoxicated people into the premises should be managed by a good duty manager. Checking for identification should be also managed by the duty manager.
- 26. Should any person be identified as intoxicated I do not expect the duty manager just to ask them to leave if they are driving, but to either arrange safe transportation home or contact the Police. State Highway 2 is notorious for traffic related accidents and sending someone back to their

car to drive back onto State Highway 2 in a drunken state is not benefiting the community in any way shape or form.

- 27. The car park out the front of the store should be visible from the serving counter for this reason alone, therefore I do not expect the windows to be covered in advertising.
- 28. On another note, I would suggest CCTV cameras are installed that also allow voice pick-up.

Conclusion

29. I have no concerns with the design and layout of the premises, other than ensuring the windows are clear to allow a clear field of vision into the car parking area.

5.3 Other Goods and Services

30. Apart from alcohol, the applicant intends to sell cigarettes.

5.4 Amenity and Good Order of the Locality

The locality

- 31. Te Puna is regarded by the locals as a village. It is a small community that extends out into the Minden Hills and in the opposite direction, towards the harbour. The central point of Te Puna is the main roundabout where State-Highway 2 segments the village onto either side of the road.
- 32. The proposed bottle store would be situated within the current commercial area and sits within the building on the current tavern.
- 33. The commercial area has the following alcohol related business within close proximity to the proposed bottle store:
 - Te Puna Liquor Centre bottle store (56 metres from the proposed bottle store)
 - Te Puna Tavern
 - Top Shot Bar
 - The White House restaurant
- 34. On the opposite side of State-Highway 2 are the following alcohol related businesses:
 - Four Square grocery store
 - Nourish Café
- 35. Also located in and around Te Puna:

- A distillery with a remote sale off-licence
- A specialist importer of Belgium beer with a remote sale off-licence
- The Cider Factorie, that holds an off and on-licence
- Persimmon Lane café
- Te Puna Rugby Club
- 36. The commercial area also comprises of a veterinary practice, butcher, bakery, clothing retailers, lumber yard, Farmland's store, backpacker accommodation that forms part of the tavern, a real estate agency, motel, and an irrigation equipment supplier. The commercial area services the needs of the local community.

Visual amenity

37. I cannot provide any further information as to how it would look, aesthetically. My assumption based on where the director has worked in the past would suggest it could possibly follow a similar format to the Bottle O Te Puke or Merivale liquor, which I would describe as generic liquor stores.

Comment

38. I am concerned that the opening of another bottle store could reduce the amenity and good order of the local landscape. The potential impact of another bottle store trying to establish its presence within a small market and appropriate market share from its competitors, could have a negative impact on the local community with respect to alcohol related harm. In addition, the risk of selling to minors may increase in the face of such competition.

5.5 Planning and Building Matters

- 39. A Planning and Building certificate is attached, as required, under section 100(f) of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012.
- 40. The certificate shows that the proposed use of the premises meets the requirements of the Resource Management Act 1991 and building code.

5.6 Previous History

41. There is no previous application / liquor store history with this application.

5.7 Site Inspection

42. The premises is not ready to be inspected. The Director was invited to the Council offices at Barkes Corner to talk through the application.

- 43. The application is well thought out and I believe the applicant has good intentions.
- 44. My expectations regarding signage and operations were communicated clearly and I have no doubt the applicant will deliver with respect to ensuring the store complies with the requirements under the act with respect to not serving minors, intoxicated people and making sure a qualified duty manager is always on the premises to oversee the sale of alcohol.
- 45. What was apparent from the meeting was the Director has commercial experience. It was asked of the Director, what business strategy will the applicant be incorporating to compete against another bottle store, approximately 56 meters away?
- 46. The director claimed his differentiating strategy would be based on providing a better quality of customer service than his competitor. This is where I foresee a potential problem.
- 47. I am not convinced that customers in the local market of Te Puna will be swayed by the better customer service provided by the applicant. What I suspect will happen is that the initial pricing strategy of the applicant's offering will be like Te Puna Liquor Centre, with the hope that a smile and helpful advice will sway customers to the applicant's store.
- 48. What I haven't seen is any research into what the residents of Te Puna need or want from a bottle store. The need for better customer service seems to be nothing more than an assumption, which I am not entirely sure will increase the market share of the applicant.
- 49. This new bottle store would be selling identical products to its competitors. I am not of the opinion that customers would visit another bottle store unless they sell products of a different nature, or their prices are less than that of their competitors.
- 50. For customers to purchase their alcoholic beverages at the new bottle store, I believe there needs to be valid reason to do so and bearing in mind both bottle stores will be selling products that are identical. The only differentiating factor could be price.
- 51. Therefore, for the applicant to gain market share and be successful, I believe they will need to price their products lower than the competition.
- 52. I do not believe customers are loyal to their retailers, but they are loyal to their brands and if those brands can be purchased at a cheaper price, I fail to see why they wouldn't purchase elsewhere to save money.
- 53. I anticipate that the Te Puna Liquor Centre will retaliate, and a price war will commence with an overarching focus on commercial gain, rather than consideration for the impact on community.

Comment:

54. The applicant appears, on paper, to have the appropriate systems, staff, and training to comply with the law, but of a greater concern is where the new proposed bottle store is located.

6. ENVIRONMENTAL SCAN

- 6.1 Current and Potential Levels of Noise, Nuisance and Vandalism
 - 55. There is no information to suggest the local area is affected by crime or associated with criminal activity. Although, recent unsubstantiated information has come to light to indicate some residents have reported suspicious behaviour on their properties in recent months.

7. CONCLUSION

- 7.1 Conclusion
 - 56. I have inquired into the application, and based on the information provided, I have concerns on the impact of this bottle store proposal in such close proximity to the current bottle store that serves the local community.
 - 57. I feel this matter needs to be explored further and not enough information is presented within the application to convince me that needs of the community have truly been considered.
 - 58. Therefore, I oppose this application as I feel these matters need to be addressed in front of the committee.

REPORT ON APPLICATION FOR 'OFF' LICENCE SALE AND SUPPLY OF ALCOHOL ACT 2012

An application for the issuing of an Off Licence for the above named applicant and premises was received by the New Zealand Police at the Western Bay of Plenty Liquor Licensing Unit.

Following a review of the application Police are opposed.

The applicant is affiliated with the new owner of the Te Puna Tavern and seeks to establish an OFF licenced store attached to the tavern building.

Police oppose the issuance of an Off licence on the basis that there is already an existing off licensed premises within 50 meters of the proposed site, being Te Puna Liquor Centre.

Police believe that the Te Puna community is serviced sufficiently by the one existing store given the population density of this rural area and that the existence of a second store is likely to prompt a price war leading to lower prices. Availability and price are two of the recognised factors that can lead to the inappropriate and excessive consumption of alcohol.

It is difficult for any licensee to monitor the use of alcohol sold from an off licence as a considerable amount of the alcohol consumed in New Zealand is done so at private residences having been purchased from Off licenced premises.

Granted that the store offers a restricted line of products.

The Bethlehem township is but a short drive along State Highway 2, approximately 4.1Km to access further off licenced premises, which include bottle stores and supermarkets.

Police consider that the issue of the licence would have a negative effect on the amenity and good order of the locality and the DLC, in forming an opinion under section 105(1)(h) must have regard to section 106(1)(a)(iii): the number of premises for which licences of the kind concerned are already held.

Police submit that even if the amenity and good order of the locality are assessed as unlikely to be reduced further or would be likely to be reduced further to only a minor extent by the effects of the issue of the licence, it would still be undesirable to issue any further licence considering the existing store is but a stone's throw away.

Police are in the process of examining 'Police calls for service data' in relation to the Te Puna area likely to be serviced by the proposed store. I can unequivocally state that there are incidents of alcohol related harm in the area, mainly alcohol fuelled family harm events.

As recently as 28 December 2020 Police responded to an incident involving a 16-yearold youth from Minden road who had consumed approximately 80 beers over a couple of days. He was taken to hospital by ambulance and became exceptionally violent requiring to be detained by Police. He explained that he had purchased the alcohol from the Te Puna store and when asked for age identification he told the staff he was 18. He further stated that the staff told him to remember his identification the next time and proceeded with the sale. The youth's caregiver (grandmother) attended the store and challenged the staff about the sale.

Police believe that a second Off licenced store in the same location would not support the Object of the Act of minimising the harm caused by excessive and inappropriate consumption of alcohol.

Police would like the DLC to note that the applicant's suitability is not the subject of this opposition. I have met the applicant and observed him in an unrelated hearing and found him to be quite knowledgeable of the Act and the obligations and responsibilities imposed.
