

- To receive reports from Council appointees on Council matters relevant to the Community Board.
- To have input into Council and its Committees on issues and plans that affect communities within the Community Board area.

BACKGROUND

For my last Community Board report this year, here are some of Ōmokoroa's achievements and events for this previous year.

We said goodbye to Miriam Taris, our previous CEO, and welcomed John Holyoake into the position.

The Old Library and Old Pavilion became a hot topic of discussion for the community and the Community Board. The results of these discussions were expressions of interest for both buildings. TOLO (The Old Library Ōmokoroa) was adopted; TOLO is extra space and resource for the community. The Old Pavilion is also to be an extra space for the community. It will be moved to another position on Western Avenue, refurbished and made available to the community for use.

One of the expressions of interest for the Old Pavilion was the MenzShed group. After many meetings and discussions between the Board, Council, and the MenzShed, it was agreed that this building was not suitable or in the best position in Ōmokoroa for its intended use.

The Board and Council worked alongside the MenzShed to find a suitable building and position for them. All agreed that the buildings on the corner of the Ōmokoroa and Prole Road would suffice in the interim. The group has now adopted these buildings. I am aware that there is much work behind the scenes to get the buildings ready for use. They are currently applying for grants and looking forward to being able to give back to the community.

As a community, we welcomed two new bridges over the railway line, providing safe pedestrian passage.

The community had the chance to give feedback on the Long-Term Plan, which is now adopted.

The completed bund, the walkway at the end of the golf course, was officially opened on 30th October 2021. Our Mayor, Gary Webber, our new CEO, John Holyoake, myself, Council staff, and community members were in attendance. The work is now underway on the pathway from the golf course to Kaylene place.

The community has experienced constant road works and has been patient and kind to the workers, and the road works, which will continue for a while yet.

I am aware that community groups and the Community Board have sent applications to Council for more CCTV in Ōmokoroa. The results of these applications will be presented and discussed with Council.

We also experienced more lockdowns this year. During "lockdown walks", it was identified that there are some reserves that are possibly in need of beautifying; two in particular; one is Precious Reserve, and the other is at the end of Western Avenue. We must continue to evolve our green spaces as more houses and buildings are constructed in our community.

Members of the community have also enquired as to when there will be access from Josephine place to the boardwalk.

Community Groups

<u> Ōmokoroa Public Arts Group (OPAG) - Member Teresa Sage</u>

Installation of the Kuaka structure will be able to happen once Dave Roy has completed the project. Due to COVID-19 there have been delays.

The black walnut log has been dried and stored and will produce a mural for placement at the new library. The next stage will be to call for expressions of interest. The future mural at the domain will wait for the new playground's completion before commencing. The painting could be effected due to dust and debris.

The group is looking at how to provide a map of the peninsula to highlight all places of interest.

<u>Ōmokoroa Settlers Hall (OSH) - Member Derek Sage</u>

Since the last Community Board meeting, the OSH have had one regular meeting and their AGM.

The Committee is continuing to manage the general maintenance and have ensured compliances are met. The exploration of the issue of repairs to the small hall has required a special meeting to resolve.

At the AGM, Trish Clokie has taken over from Jo Richards (who had stepped down) as secretary, and we said farewell to Bill Cameron and Gordon Gravatt, who have resigned. Gordon has served on the Committee for at least 20 years, so takes with him some of the OSH institutional knowledge.

The AGM highlighted that with the next stages of COVID-19 in New Zealand the leaders of the various user groups are insisting that participation requires having had the two vaccination shots. The OSH Committee resolved that they have an expectation that those employed by the hall for maintenance will be required to have had both vaccination shots. Clearly a sign of the times.

<u>Ōmokoroa Sport and Recreation Society [OSRS] Report October 2021- Member Peter</u> Presland

The AGM for the OSRS was held on 4 October 2021. Richard Gerrish and Dennis Cresswell were both re-elected unopposed to the roles of Chairman and Treasurer respectively. After 5 years of excellent service Andrea Willoughby did not stand for re-election as Secretary. Andrew Reynolds was elected [unopposed] to that role.

Once into committee it was confirmed that auditors Giles and Co would carry out an audit of the Society accounts. Treasurer Cresswell provided an update on the finances of the Society which remain very healthy. Accordingly, it was decided to maintain the annual membership fee at \$100.00 per member group.

The Society continues to function extremely well, with Sarah Aldridge doing an excellent job as Booking Officer for the Pavilion.

BACKGROUND

It's been a while! Since our last meeting on 3 August much has happened: The most significant change has been the mandating of the Government Three Waters reform process, a move our Council does not agree with.

Another significant change for our Council has been the adoption of a new brand style which will be slowly rolled out as signs etc need replacing.

Coinciding with a rearrangement of the public reception area at Barkes Corner, the new brand and colour palette will be a very obvious difference when you next visit the Council offices.

Audit and Risk Committee has met twice, with nothing to report that might frighten the horses!

Council has met four times, the major meeting being the one discussing the Three Waters reform where our response to the Minister was crafted. This, like the responses from other Councils appeared to be ignored and the change has, subsequently, been mandated.

The Annual Report for the last financial year has been signed off by Council and given a tick by Audit New Zealand so that is a pleasing result.

The CCTV committee and their parameters have been established with applications to the fund opened and closed. We await their deliberations.

The Policy Committee have started the process for the District Plan review. Because of the upheaval being driven from Wellington on all things Local Government, our Council is taking a softly, softly approach to this project. Legally it must be done but until there is clarity from central government on the changes they are making, Council does not

want to expend more time and resources than are absolutely necessary on this major piece of work.

The Policy Committee has also put out the Draft Local Alcohol Policy and the Draft Alcohol Control Bylaw for community comment.

The Performance and Monitoring Committee has begun to consider Katikati Wastewater Treatment Plant Effluent Reuse and Disposal Options.

On November 6, Councillors joined with the five hapū on Matakana/Rangiwaea Islands at the Opureora Marae for the formal signing of the deed of transfer to return Panepane Purakau land blocks back to a Trust representing the five hapū. It was a great privilege to be part of such a momentous day. The deed now goes to the Māori Land Court for ratification.

The proposed Fire Station Hard Standing parking area has been cost estimated by WestLink. Staff are currently investigating options to add this project as a variation to the Ōmokoroa Urbanisation Project but will be still funded by the Board.

Two cycle maintenance stations have been proposed, to be located at the beginning of the Ōmokoroa Cycleway link and Ōmokoroa Point School. Both locations are yet to be confirmed.

Transportation - Road Improvements LED Lighting

Description: Council owns and operates 2,500 streetlights on local roads. Close to 100 of these are LED. Installation of LED lights reduces power consumption by 60%. Cost reduction is on the energy charges as line charges are a fixed fee. Waka Kotahi are offering an 85% subsidy to invest in the street light conversion conditional upon it being completed by June 2021. Council has decided to participate in this.

What's Happened:

Works to install LED luminaires in the west and east sections of the District is complete.

What's Next:

Upgrading of decorative lighting, mainly recent subdivisions, has been delayed by material supply issues and is likely to commence early 2022.

Specific lighting design, which is required for "V" category lighting on high volume roads, such as Te Puke Highway and Ōmokoroa Road, will be considered once the installation of decorative lighting is complete.

Utilities

Western Solid Waste

Description: Waste management that meets the needs of the community and protects the environment for present and future generations.

What's Happened:

The Council led Kerbside Rubbish and Recycling Service commenced on 1 July 2021. A Pay as you throw (PAYT) user-pays tag system applies for rubbish collection. Collection of red lid rubbish bins will be available each week. Bins need to be put out at 7am on collection day with a PAYT tag correctly attached through both the red handle and black lug.

The Kerbside Collection service has proved very popular. There has been a significant increase in glass recycling throughout the District. For the 3 months prior to the service commencing there was an average of 72.57 tonnes of glass recycled per month and therefore diverted from landfill. From 1 July to 31 July 2021 Council's three recycle centres diverted 47.71 tonnes of glass, Council's kerbside collection diverted 77.55 tonnes of glass in the same month. The total amount of glass diverted through a WBOPDC service in July was 125.26 tonnes of glass which is an increase of approx. 52.7 tonnes.

What's Next:

PAYT tags are available for purchase at supermarkets and other retail outlets during lockdown. A list of retailers selling PAYT can be found <u>here</u>.

Reserves

Reserves - Ōmokoroa Domain

Description: Implement the approved Domain Concept Plan including the destination playground.

What's Happened:

Domain playground construction is progressing well under Alert Level 2 protocols. The target completion date for early December remains is on track for now, subject to Covid 19 alert levels. In addition to the playground works, design refinement (of the adopted concept plan) for the foreshore area between the public toilet and Crapp Reserve is underway.

What's Next:

Continue to progress playground construction subject to Covid 19 alert levels and any supply chain delays due to the knock-on effect of alert level changes. There is a risk that the original target completion date moves out past Christmas.

Conclude foreshore design to Crapp Reserve for implementing post summer holiday season.

Reserves - Ōmokoroa Stormwater Bund and Walkway/Cycleway

Description: Construction of a coastal bund shared path walkway along the esplanade reserve adjoining the Ōmokoroa Golf Club.

What's Happened:

- Construction of Stage 3 Boardwalk is underway.
- Additional caution signage has been installed.
- Boundary survey has been completed.

What's Next:

- Complete construction of Stage 3 Boardwalk.
- An official opening with the Golf Club 31 October if alert levels remain at level 2.
- Resolve boundary issues e.g., give and take fencing agreement.
- Construction of remaining path from the Boardwalk to Kayelene Place to be completed before Christmas 2021.

Reserves - Prole Road to Pahoia Walkway/Cycleway

Description: Construction of a cycleway suspension bridge across the Waipapa Stream.

What's Happened:

• The bridge construction is well underway under Covid Alert Level 2. The bridge tower on the Ōmokoroa side was erected on Friday 22 October.

- Access from the Pahoia Road end of the route is enabled for bridge construction traffic only at this stage.
- The water main on the Pahoia side was realigned to provide clearance for the bridge tower foundations.
- Landscape planting on the Ōmokoroa side has been completed (resource consent condition).

What's Next:

- Progress suspension bridge construction.
- Conclude the lease agreement & Kawaneta with Ngaati Hauaa.
- Conclude either a land purchase or easement / lease agreement with affected property owners on the Pahoia side of the Waipapa Stream, to ensure public access is secured across a small section of private land.
- Progress cycleway lease agreement with KiwiRail.

ENGINEERING / SPECIAL PROJECTS

Prole Road Urbanisation – Ōmokoroa Road to Waipapa River Description: Prole Road is part of the Crown Infrastructure Partnership programme and partly funded by the Government.

What's Happened:

The design of Prole Road urbanisation from Ōmokoroa Road to the Waipapa River is still being finalised. The project is running behind schedule due ongoing discussions with the landowners and adjacent developers and going through the consenting issues. Since the instigation of this project, several developers have bought large amounts of properties adjacent to Prole Road and are now planning to subdivide their land at the same time as Prole Road is being upgraded. This has required Council to make a number of changes to roading and other infrastructure to accommodate the subdivision requirements. This is causing further delays to the final design and construction of Prole Road.

What's Next:

Discuss with the adjacent landowners and land developers and finalise design of the project. Consult other stakeholders, get the necessary consents, and finalise contract documents for tendering the construction work. Construction work is anticipated to commence next year once the design, landowner and consenting issues are finalised.

Western Avenue Urbanisation – Ōmokoroa Road to North of Gane Place

Description: Urbanisation of Western Avenue as a CIP and Structure Plan Project. The works integrates some planned reserve development example footpaths and cycleways on adjacent Council reserves.

What's Happened:

Public has been consulted and the design of the project is complete. Council is now negotiating a price with the preferred contractor and once the price is confirmed, construction will start.

It is expected that some construction work will incur prior to Christmas this year with bulk of the works completed by June 2022.

What's Next:

Appoint a contractor and start construction work in Summer this year (2021).

New Southern Industrial Road

Description: Ōmokoroa Industrial Road design and construction including right turn bay on Ōmokoroa Road.

What's Happened:

The design for the Southern Industrial Road is complete and tender document is currently being finalised for tendering the construction of the industrial road. While this process is happening, Council investigating options for constructing a permanent stormwater pond at the start of the existing gully to treat the runoff from the Industrial Road and the upper catchments areas.

What's Next:

Prepare contract document for tendering the construction of the Industrial Road in early New Year (2022).

Ōmokoroa Road Urbanisation Stage 1 - Western Avenue to Tralee Street

Description: Ōmokoroa Urbanisation Project - Western Avenue to Tralee Street including services, walking, and cycling and bus stops.

What's Happened:

The project is under construction and the contractor is making an excellent progress. There has been slight delay in the construction due to Covid shutdown however, the target date for the project is still June 2022.

What's Next:

Complete the works by June 2022.

Ōmokoroa Road Urbanisation Stage 2 - Prole Road to Railway Track

Description: Ōmokoroa Urbanisation Project from Prole Road to the railway line. Includes two roundabouts and four-laning from Prole Road to Flounder Place.

What's Happened:

The design for this section has been extended to include 4 lanes from Prole Rd/Ōmokoroa Road intersection to Flounder Drive intersection to allow for the future JACE town centre development.

Council is currently working with both the Ministry of Education and JACE Development to come up with an effective design which will cater for both the MOE and JACE town centre in the future years. The work includes the redesigning of the section from Prole Road to Flounder Drive to make it 2 lanes in each direction to serve the community over the next 20 years.

What's Next:

Complete the redesign of this project and appoint a contractor in early 2022 to start the construction work when the design is finalised.

Ōmokoroa Road Pedestrian Bridges

Description: Ōmokoroa Road Urbanisation Project. Construction of two pedestrian bridges over the railway and walking connections. This project is practically complete and only minor works are remaining to be during the defect's liability period.

Both the pedestrian/cycle bridges are practically complete and minor works e.g., topsoil and hydro-seeding remain to be competed over the defect's liability period.

What's Next:

Complete minor works by end of 2021.

STRATEGIC PROPERTY

Property - Development Town Centre Ōmokoroa

Description: Ōmokoroa Town Centre Development in accordance with direction as resolved by the Community Board - McDonnell Street property purchase and pavilion relocation.

What's Happened:

The lease for both the old Library and the MenzShed have been signed. Planning is underway for the relocation of the Old Sports Pavilion and its subsequent refurbishment.

What's Next:

Planning and geotechnical work will be completed for the relocation of the Old Sports Pavilion.

Emergency Management

With the Departure of Ben Wilson from the role of Community Resilience advisor and the subsequent appointment of Jo Lynksy, we look forward to strengthening relationships and working with the Ōmokoroa residents to establish strong resilience within the community in the event of an emergency.
